JWACS primary parent Mr Paul Henneberry is an amazing ukulele craftsman.



Alumni wins City to Surf Half Marathon!

Rochelle wins again!

Past pupil Rochelle Rodgers nee Thorpe (Class of 2004) has won the women's 21.1km Chevron City to Surf for Activ Half Marathon for 2016.

Rochelle said she hoped she would place in the top three and did not expect to win the event but she did crossing the line in the winning time of 1:21:42. Rodgers, the 2013 champion, has completed every Half Marathon since they were added to the City to Surf more than a decade ago.

Most of the Chevron City to Surf for Activ competitors would take a well-earned break after running the City to Surf race but not long-distance runner Rochelle, who was just getting started.

I'm doing the Melbourne Marathon which is the Australian Championships this year," Rodgers said. "I had to finish the (City to Surf) Half Marathon feeling like I could keep running. So the next day I got up and did a 60-minute run. The goal for Melbourne is to finish in 2:45 so I've got to get the kilometres in my legs."

She has also been invited as an elite competitor to the Tokyo Marathon in 2017. Rochelle trains seven days a week covering an average of 145km a week. A typical day could start with a 9km jog in the morning and finish with a 15km run after work. On Sundays she has time for a longer run of 2.5 hours.

29-year-old Rochelle is a good friend of John Wollaston's Head of Physical Education, Lonneke Holleman who competed in the Melbourne Marathon in

2015. They run together for Front Runner Sports.

Rochelle works for The Running Centre, which is a specialty running store that

provides a medically based shoe fitting service. Her running coach Raf Baugh is also her boss.Rochelle said that since training under Raf she has won several major races in Perth (Chevron City to Surf Half Marathon and the Perth

Marathon both won twice). "He has me striving for my goal to represent Australia at a Commonwealth and Olympic level for the marathon (42.2km)," she said.

"I am very lucky to be surrounded by people who have faith in me. I enjoy giving back to my sport and do this by coaching a few juniors and recreational runners several times a week as well as holding a free community run," she said

Rochelle attended John Wollaston Anglican Community School from










Hairspray!




Principal's Art Acquisition
